Found in the Basement!



We recently found original spray paint that would have been used on Oliver tractors produced at the Charles City plant in our basement archives. Had we not stumbled upon these by accident, we would have no idea they were sitting on a shelf in the room we call our tractor archives. These spray paint cans are now on display as part of the "Behind the Scenes at the Oliver Plant" special exhibit. The cans range in age with one being from the 1950s to some of the others being from potentially the late 1970s.

Strikes at the Oliver Plant

The new special exhibit on display in the tractor room tells the story of life at the Oliver plant in Charles City. An element of plant history the display highlights is the history of strikes at the Oliver plant. This spotlight was inspired by original documentation from the strikes we found recently in our basement archives. An excellent resource used while curating this exhibit was John D. Culbertson's book The Tractor Builders.

Like many industrial corporations in the United States, the Oliver corporation endured its fair share of tension spurred on by union negotiations and dissatisfied employees. Union organization at the Charles City plant began in 1939. The union was Local 115 of the United Farm Workers of American initially but was later Local 115-F of the Machine Workers of America, and even later became Local 1315 of the United Auto Workers in 1956.

Strikes at the Charles City plant occurred in 1946, 1949, 1951, and 1959. The 1951 strike was referred to as the "Panther Hunt" because the 400 foundry workers who walked out sited an alleged panther on the loose spotted in northeastern Iowa as the reason for their leaving. In actuality, the foundry workers were unhappy with the discrepancies in the piece rates paid on the slinger unit. On January 19 the 400

foundry workers walked off the job and the following Monday the entire plant walked off. Eventually, in February of 1951, the strike was determined to be illegal by Dr. Clarence M. Updegraff, the arbitrator for the legal case that was submitted by the plant. The strike ended but not without leaving a lasting impact on the relationship between the plant and the union. The union would order a strike again in 1959 and that time picketers were outside on the picket line during the worst blizzard in Iowa in the last 20 years.

Union and corporate relationships at the Charles City Oliver plant represent



one of the more intense elements of factory life, among other things. Nevertheless, both entities operated in support of the plant workers and the continued prosperity of the business.
